During this academic year we have used the funding to ensure we could take pupils along to competitions (e.g. Panathlon, Network Games etc.) by providing transport. We have also been able to help provide 1-1 support for pupils and have purchased adapted equipment to support SEND pupils in their lessons and in extra-curricular activities e.g. Sensory Circuits. In this academic year 70% of our pupils have taken part in an extra-curricular opportunity to represent the school. 52% (24 out of 46 pupils) of our SEND register took up this opportunity.

	11.	How has your school targeted any spending on increasing or improving girls' access to PE lessons?	We have always been inclusive as in the past we've used funding to allow engagement by all pupils but this year we have changed elements of the curriculum to be more inclusive using the funding. This has included changing Y3 Cricket to Rounders with elements of both sports taught due to taking both girls, boys and mixed teams to represent the school in Cricket from Y4-6. We have also sent some Y5 pupils on the Primary Girls Football Leadership/ Activator Training. This Leadership training is then taken by the girls back into school and allows them to help facilitate games within lessons and looking to make football within school and the curriculum accessible for all.

	13.	How has your school targeted any spending on increasing or improving girls' access to extra-curricular sport and physical activities?	At Hunter's Bar we are an official FA Wildcats Centre (FA Girls' only Football Centre). We are the only primary within Sheffield to offer this opportunity for female footballers to develop their skills & have fun using the Wildcats system. This girls only Football initiative, is an After-school club open to Hunter's Bar pupils and girls from the local area who are not pupils at Hunter's Bar. 16-18 girls in Y2-6 have taken up this opportunity since February. Girls have been signposted to local football clubs (Nether Green FC & Crosspool Jnrs) from our Wildcats centre and we have been part of the FA's "Play On" Pilot.

How has your school targeted spending to provide or improve opportunities in sport and physical activities for disadvantaged pupils?	<p>Over the course of this academic year Pupil Premium/FSM pupils had the option to halve the payment for clubs (with half paid for by parents and then half paid for by the school) which enabled pupils the opportunity to experience a club that they might not be able to afford otherwise. We have also offered the option for parents to contact the office discreetly to pass on any information to allow school to fund anywhere from 50%-100% if this is needed for a disadvantaged pupil to be able to access and Extra-Curricular opportunities.</p> <p>Disadvantaged pupils are taken to various festivals and competitions across the academic year but the Points Network Games allows us to pick thirty, Y3-6 Pupil Premium and or Free-School Meals pupils to go and represent the school in a inter and intra-competition at the English Institute of Sport. The funding is used to pay for the competition, transport, and provide lunches for any pupils that need it.</p> <p>In this academic year 70% of our pupils have taken part in an extra-curricular opportunity to represent the school. 44% (20 out of 45 pupils) of these pupils were Free School Meals or Pupil Premium pupils.</p>

	18.	How has your school's spending improved PE attainment?	<p>All children within Hunter's Bar Juniors participates in 2 hours of PE every week taught by the PE Lead. All equipment bought is available to be used within lessons and also during breaks, lunchtimes and pupils breaks e.g. Brain Breaks and Sensory Circuits. Inclusion resources have also been brought or adapted from previously bought equipment. Before school clubs, active Lunchtimes and after school clubs also add to the menu of physical activity that supports the achievement of this target.</p> <p>Providing a good breadth of balanced activities allows our pupils to experience and develop a range of activities within the curriculum. Opportunities like Swimming (Y3/4) and Bikeability (Y5) provide pupils with opportunities to learn skills within the curriculum that</p>	

			could help them to navigate (surrounding) areas safely and with confidence. Sufficient time within the curriculum is provided to allow pupils to make sufficient progress on each activity. Pupils wishing to develop these activities further or try out their skills are able to attend internal/external clubs or festivals / competitions.
		How has your school's spending increased pupil PE and sport activity levels?	<p>Pupils at this school receive a broad and balanced range of activities that supports their development. The curriculum is suitably broad, underpinned by Physical Literacy skills and enables for progression within an activity. Extra-curricular activities provide additional breadth and diversity. Break and Lunchtimes provide our Sports Leaders and MDSA's the opportunity to lead a range of activities using a wide range of equipment.</p> <p>Pupils are invited to attend sensory circuits if it's felt that the movement sessions would benefit their start to the school day and their general health and well-being. Pupils attending are not only active during the session but the session allows them to get prepared for the day ahead and exhibit a 'ready to learn' attitude after attending these sessions.</p> <p>Over this academic year we have provided: Yoga, Karate, Street Dance, Basketball, Netball, Boulderling, Padel and Wildcats (Girls Football) after-school sessions.</p> <p>We have also provided: Squash, Tennis, Gymnastics, Street Dance, Bollywood, Gardening, Show Choir and Running Lunch-time clubs.</p> <p>In this academic year 54% of our pupils have taken part in extra-curricular clubs with 67% of pupils taking part in staff ran clubs and a combined 91% (330 out of 361 pupils) of the school taking part in one or the other.</p>
		How has your school's spending increased school sport participation?	<p>Pupils at Hunters Bar Juniors are afforded considerable opportunities to take part in festivals, intra and inter school competitions and events. The school aims to give as many children as possible the chance to take part in suitable opportunities that give pupils a sense of pride and identity. This is intended to also teach the skills and qualities of working cooperatively in a team, experiencing success or disappointment and developing resilience, all essential life skills. Funding has been used to pay for various things including competition entry, equipment, staffing and travel to and from events. In this academic year 70% of our pupils have taken part in an inter-school extra-curricular opportunity to represent the school in a festival or competition.</p> <p>Intra School Competitions feed into whole-school house system (Gem-Families: Diamond, Emerald, Ruby, and Sapphire).</p> <p>Sports Day is a whole School event held off site at Goodwin Sports Centre. This year we had a 97% participation rate. 347 pupils (out of 360) attended in July 2025.</p>
		How has your school's spending increased and continued professional	<p>The upskilling of staff has been developed through continued supported work between the PE Lead and the teaching staff at the school. The PE Lead works alongside staff to assist in their subject knowledge and delivery of PE and Sport. The PE Lead has engaged with local and national developments and engaged with relevant networks and groups to ensure that he is fully informed about PE, the curriculum and the requirements of the Sport Premium Plan.</p> <p>Members of staff have also attended external courses/training (including online courses) in order to enhance their knowledge and understanding of PE and active learning across the curriculum. The combination of Supporting staff with training and up-to-date developments, ensures that all staff are confident to deliver lessons effectively and are aware of new developments in the subject area.</p> <p>We have external Play Leader training (through A. Staley – Points Learning Network) for selected Y5/6 pupils to highlight of</p>

			importance of this position. 20 pupils trained in September 2024 and have delivered games and activities on the playground until the end of the year.	
		How has your school's spending improved swimming attainment?	Over this academic year, using the Sports Premium, we bought an additional block of swimming allowing pupils in Year 4 and Year 3 to swim throughout the academic year. Swimming lessons throughout the year allowed us to target our weaker swimmers for extra lessons increasing their water confidence and safety as well as specifically targeting the Sheffield Swim Services 3 targets of swimming 25m, swimming a range of strokes over 10m and performing a safe water rescue.

How is your school going to ensure that the improvements made through its spending of the PE and sport premium are sustainable	The majority of our spending this year has been on Staff CPD, helping our disadvantaged (PP/FSM) children access extra-curricular activities and clubs, Curriculum lessons and equipment. All of these specific areas have allowed pupils to have lasting memories and develop holistically through experiences through the PE curriculum as well as through extra-curricular opportunities. Equipment is stored and well looked after allowing the use of it throughout school and sustainability in being able to use it for years to come. Staff development and up-skilling through team-teaching or leading PE lessons with the PE Leads support ensures that if for any reason the PE Lead is not available, staff should feel confident enough to be able to continue delivering high quality PE for their pupils for the foreseeable future.
