





Adult wolves usually grow to around 1.5m long. Wolves only usually weigh between 22kg and 50kg but the heaviest wolf on record weighed over 79kg.

Wolves are double-coated. This means that they have two layers of fur. The outer layer of fur is made up of tough guard hairs. These keep dirt and water away from the wolf's skin. The wolf's undercoat is much softer and warmer. The wolf will often shed this coat in the summer because there are more daylight hours. However, it does help to keep them warm during winter.



### Who Wolves Live With

Wolves normally live in groups called packs. A pack is often made up of six to ten wolves from the same family. Packs are led by a parent male and a parent female.

Female wolves give birth to a litter of five or six young each spring. The young are known as pups or whelps. Wolves usually live for between six and eight years in the wild but they can live for much longer if they are being looked after.







### What Wolves Eat

The wolf is a carnivore which means that they eat other animals. They are also an apex predator. This means that they are at the top of the food chain and do not have any predators in the wild.

Wolves are pack hunters so they work together to hunt prey. They use their excellent senses of smell and hearing to do this.

Wolves usually eat large, hoofed animals like deer, elk or mountain goats. They will also eat smaller animals like rabbits, squirrels and mice.

#### Did You Know...?

The wolf has the Latin name 'Canis lupus'. This means 'dog wolf' in English.



Wolves howl to communicate with one another across long distances. A wolf's howl can give important information, such as:



- its location;
- nearby predators;
- the position of prey.

Sometimes, wolves will howl together as a pack. This strengthens their bond with one another. Some studies have even shown that wolves will howl at one another as a sign that they like each other.


Pupils' own responses, such as: If a wolf lost its ability to howl, I think that it would struggle to get other wolves to help it when it is hunting and struggle to bond with other wolves in the pack.











### Appearance

Adult wolves usually grow to around 1.5m long from nose to tail tip and those that live in the north grow longer and larger than those that live further south. While wolves only usually weigh between 22kg and 50kg, the heaviest wolf on record weighed over 79kg.

Wolves are double-coated. This means that they have two layers of fur, which can be black, brown, grey, white, red and **taupe**. The outer layer of fur is made up of tough guard hairs that repel dirt and water; this layer helps the wolf to stay clean. The undercoat of the wolf is much softer and warmer. It is often shed in the summer because there are more daylight hours but this fluffy undercoat helps to keep wolves warm during harsh winter temperatures.



### **Family**

Wolves normally live in groups called packs, which are made up of six to ten wolves that are family members. Packs are led by a parent male and a parent female, who are sometimes known as the alphas.

Female wolves give birth to a litter of five or six young each spring. The young are known as pups or whelps. Wolves tend to live for between six and eight years in the wild and for up to 17 years in captivity.






#### Diet

The wolf is a **carnivore** and an **apex predator**. They are pack hunters who have evolved to work together to hunt prey and they use their excellent senses of smell and hearing to do this.

Wolves most commonly eat large, hoofed animals, such as deer, elk or mountain goats. They will also eat smaller animals like rabbits, squirrels and mice.

Within a pack, the alpha male and alpha female eat first. Then, the other members of the pack feed. If there are particularly young members of a pack, adult wolves will swallow food and then **requrgitate** it to feed their young.



### Howling
