Writing Week 6 – Looking back on your year



Lesson 1 – How can I use Oracy to help remember my experiences?

What a year it has been. No one could have predicted how this school year would end!

However, even though it has been an unusual end to the year, we feel that it is the perfect time to look back and remind yourself of the highlights and wonderful memories of your time in J4, J5 and J6.

Reflecting back on our memories can be very good for our wellbeing as it allows us to enjoy and appreciate previous experiences and achievements.

This week, you will be remembering, planning and writing a reflection on your year.

Task 1 – Go back into your long term memory....

Shut your eyes and try and think of what it was like meeting your teacher/s for the very first time as Year 3s. Can you remember your first day in Y4, back in September? What was your classroom like? Where did you sit? Can you remember where your coat peg was?

Task 2 – Add some detail to your memories

Now tell an adult as much as you can remember from Y4, using these questions. Have a think before you start talking.

- 1) What was your first impression of your teacher?
- 2) What did you think of your classroom?
- 3) Who were your closest friends?
- 4) Did you make any new friends?
- 5) What trips out of school can you remember?
- 6) What visitors came into Y4?
- 7) What themes did you learn about?
- 8) What was your favourite subject? Why?
- 9) What learning achievement are you most proud of? Art, Writing, Maths, PE, Drama etc. Give your reasons.

Task 3 – Did you miss any memories?

Here are some events and a few prompts for you to enjoy thinking about. Add in any extra memories we have not included. If you would like, you could draw these memories onto a piece of paper.

Talk about these with an adult and enjoy the feeling of all these memories rushing back into your mind.

Looking back on my time in Year 4

My first memory of J6 was back in July 2019, when I was in Year 3. I remember meeting Mr. Beauchamp and Mrs Walton and thinking WOW! these guys are fun and know their stuff. I'm going to like it here. I felt sad that I would be leaving Mr. Allen but confident that I was in safe hands. Mr Beauchamp told us about his family, family and his passion for music. One class got soaked by a bus splashing through a giant puddle! Thankfully the teachers were spared. Anyway, the film was awesome and I had a great time with my mates. We ate our lunch in the cinema and got to ask the organiser lots of questions about film ratings. It was a cool trip.

As you write each sentence...Think it.... Say it out loud...Write it...Re-read it...Improve it.

Lesson 3 - How can I proofread my reflection report to make it accurate and engaging?

Task 1

Read your report out loud to yourself and then a family member.

Task 2

Are you happy with it? Did you hear any mistakes? Is every sentence accurate? Have you missed any words out? Does each sentence make sense to you and your audience? Can you think of some ways to make it even better?

Task 3

Using a blue pencil or pen, fix all errors and add in extra detail where you can.

Challenge

Publish your writing by typing it up on the computer, re-writing on a fresh piece of paper, or even making a video on a device. Don't forget to include cool pictures to bring your memories alive.
